Program Notes by Steven Zhang

Program		<u>Bach Italian Concerto, B.W.V. 971</u> Concertos are typically written for a solo instrument and an orchestra; in Bach's Italian Concerto, the piano attempts to emulate the contrasting parts of the orchestra. The Italian Concerto was originally written for the two-manual harpsichord, which was like a piano, but only had two dynamics: soft and loud. By using the two different manuals, Bach was able
Italian Concerto, B.W.V. 971 I. Allegro	J.S. Bach	to create the different sounds of an orchestra through one instrument. With today's piano that can create a larger variety of dynamics, the contrasts are even more emphasized.
II. Andante Piano Sonata No. 23 in F minor, Op. 57 I. Allegro Assai	Beethoven	Beethoven Piano Sonata No. 23 in F minor, Op. 57 "Appassionata" Sonatas typically have three movements. The first movement of this sonata, Allegro Assai, is in Sonata-Allegro form, containing an exposition, development, and recapitulation. This is one of Beethoven's most technically challenging sonatas, and Beethoven described it as a "brilliantly executed display of emotion and music". The sonata continually alternates between beautiful melody and furious technical passages. The main theme that is played at the beginning of the piece continually returns, lastly in the long coda, which increases in tempo and intensity before ending in a hushed <i>ppp</i> tonic chord.
Excursions, Op. 20, No. 1	Barber	Barber Excursions, Op. 20, No. 1 Barber described his collection of excursions as "'Excursions' in small classical forms into regional American idioms." The one that will be played today, Excursion No. 1, has been nicknamed the "Boogie-woogie", which is an African-American blues style characterized by a repetitive bass figure. This repetitive nature of the bass in the left hand can be heard right from the beginning with the ostinato rhythm that goes throughout the entire piece.
Mephisto Waltz No. 1 Liszt Dance in the Inn from Lenau's "Faust" Liszt		<u>Liszt Mephisto Waltz No. 1</u> The Mephisto Waltzes are a collection of four waltzes written throughout a period of over 20 years. The first Mephisto Waltz is one of the most popular, and was originally composed for orchestra. Liszt also wrote it for piano and piano duet. The Mephisto Waltz No. 1 is meant to depict a scene from Lanau's "Faust", a tone poem written of how Faust, the main character is manipulated by Mephistopheles, the devil. At the Dance in the Inn, Mephistopheles convinces Faust to join a wedding dance, which he then turns into a wild party through his frenetic violin playing. The piece is
