Beethoven, Sonate No. 6 in F Major, Op. 10, No. 2, 1st Movement

Beethoven's Sonate No. 6 was written from 1796 to 1798. The sonata is divided into three movements: Allegro in F major, Menuetto. Allegretto in F minor, and Presto in F major. The first movement is in sonata form. The development creates many wonderful melodies, some of which can be moderately difficult to play. The recapitulation is unusual because the 1st theme returns in D major before modulating back to tonic for the 2nd theme. This sonata is in F Major, a key Beethoven often used for more serene, pastoral-like pieces. The F Major tonality is normally used for pieces with a lighter touch, and with a lyrical quality. In this sonata, Beethoven adds a joking touch to the piece as well.

Bach, Prelude and Fugue in D Major, DWK I, BWV 850

This Prelude and Fugue comes from a collection called *The Well-Tempered Clavier*, BWV 846-893. The Well-Tempered Clavier contains two series of Prelude and Fugues in all twenty-four major and minor keys. The first book of the Well-Tempered Clavier was composed in the early 1720s, with Bach's autograph dated 1722. The collection is generally regarded as being among the most important works in the history of Western classical music.

The Prélude and Fugue in D Major, BWV 850, is a keyboard composition written by Johann Sebastian Bach. It is the fifth prélude and fugue in the first book of The Well-Tempered Clavier. Also, the prelude is composed in the style of a velocity exercise for the right hand, with the left hand contributing simple 4th note lines to accompany the flow of the 16th notes and emphasize the modulations. The piece creates a rather restless feel in the sense that the 16th lines never really "arrive" at a tonal center, but lead from one modulation to the next. The D major fugue is formally a fugue, with exposition and development. This Fugue also contains ornamental lines and dotted notes, prevalent throughout the piece.

Ravel, Sonatine in F# minor, No. 1, 1st Movement

Ravel wrote in his autobiography that he wrote the Sonatine after his piano suite Miroirs, which seems to have been written between 1903 and 1905. Ravel was encouraged by a close friend to write the first movement of the Sonatine for a competition sponsored by the Weekly Critical Review magazine. The competition requirement was the composition of the first movement of a piano sonatina no longer than 75 bars, with the prize of 100 francs. There are 3 movements in Ravel's Sonatine: I. Modéré ("moderate"), II. Mouvement de menuet ("Minuet movement"), and III. Animé ("animated") The first movement marked as Modéré-doux et expressif stays strictly in sonata form. The first theme repeats throughout in the keys of \mathcal{F} sharp minor and \mathcal{D} major, arriving at \mathcal{B} minor for the finale.

Schubert, Impromptu in Gb Major, Op. 90, No. 3

Franz Schubert's Impromptus are a series of eight pieces for solo piano composed in 1827. This Impromptu is the third piece in the first set and was published in 1857. The third piece was printed by the first publisher in G major, instead of G-flat as Schubert had written it, and remained available only in this key for many years. But now the original version is generally preferred. Impromptu in Gb Major is a classic example of Schubert's outstanding lyrical facility, as well as his penchant for long melodic lines. There is little interruption in the fluttering harp-like broken triad accompaniment, creating a tense contrast with the spacious and languid melody.
